BUILDING FUTURES FAST! SCHOOL BOND UPDATE

Dear Mattawan Community,

Shovels hit the dirt and the future is officially underway! We're bursting with excitement as we broke ground and launched the initial projects in package one of our school bond, marking the start of a transformative journey for our students. The unwavering future-focused support of the community, means the world to our students and will empower them to thrive for generations to come – thank you! Here's what's happening:



Week 1 Stadium Work Phase 1 The project has officially broken ground, with significant progress made, including installing silt fencing, decommissioning the scoreboard, removing the south goal post, and removing the skate park, which will be relocated elsewhere in the community. Excavation of the field has begun alongside the removal of the track surface. In the coming week, the team will finalize the construction coordination schedule for subcontractors, continue field excavation, move the AYSO shed, and begin tree removal and demolition prep for the detention pond.



Week 2 Stadium Work Phase 1 Recent progress on the project includes stripping topsoil from the field, completing a compensating cut at the skate park, beginning tree removal along the AYSO field tree line, and removing the track surface. In the coming week, the team plans to conduct analytical testing for the shed demolition, complete soil removal from the football field, and have Driesinga test soils in the existing field and skate park. Additional tasks include stripping topsoil from the skate park, demolishing a small shed, and starting demolition for the future detention pond. The team is addressing key issues such as scoreboard and structure planning, foundation drawings for the bleachers, and ongoing soil studies.



Week 3 Stadium Work Phase 1 The stadium project is progressing ahead of schedule! This week, significant grading took place at the stadium site, along with property scraping just north of the ECEC, across the creek. The harvested fill from this area will serve as the foundation for the new turf. Additionally, week three saw clearing work along the southwestern property line, further preparing the site for the next phase of construction.

I am fully committed to keeping you closely informed as this exciting project progresses, and with so much more to report on the horizon, it's truly hard to contain our enthusiasm for what's to come!

ThinkLaw is a program designed to teach critical thinking and problem-solving skills to students. Over the summer we sent three teachers to begin learning about the program and now the learning is growing throughout the staff. It focuses on developing students' ability to think logically, reason through problems, and make well-informed decisions. ThinkLaw helps students understand the process of reasoning and encourages them to apply that reasoning in various situations, making it a valuable tool for cultivating skills like:

- Critical Thinking: Assessing information, arguments, and evidence effectively.
- Decision-Making: Evaluating situations and making logical choices based on analysis.
- **Argumentation**: Building and defending arguments with clarity and structure.

The curriculum includes various resources and strategies for teachers to use in their classrooms, aiming to build students' cognitive skills in a hands-on and engaging way.

Traits for Tomorrow

MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS BUILDING SKILLS TO LEAD THE WAY



Mrs. Hinueber's students have been diligently working on "Leadworthy Character Traits." Focus on building empathy, self-direct skills, teamwork, responsibility, respect, kindness, courage, perseverance and integrity are woven into the Leadworthy Intermediate Course. The curriculum defines each trait and allows students to practice and grow each character trait. This initiative helps students make new discoveries about themselves and others. Further, it grows connectedness between each other and with their teacher. Students practice how to think critically and thoughtfully about situations, collaborate with classmates as a team, confidently share their thoughts, feelings, and opinions, as well as listen well to the ideas and perspectives of others. Mrs. Hinueber's students understand personal responsibility and lead with heart!



This important learning primarily occurs through discussion and group activities that are designed to help students gain insights about themselves. Their 'Reflection Notebooks' hold interactive notes and journal prompts, as well as a variety of creative and self-reflective assignments. Students engage in group work frequently as well as skits and public speaking. Mrs. Hinueber infuses standards from language arts into our lessons as well as technology.

Seen here is the "Paper Tower Challenge," with varying rounds and degrees of difficulty. Students were tasked to work collaboratively to create the tallest paper tower. Different challenges were presented to each group. The tower had to stand on its own for 1 minute. The tallest tower created was 41" tall!

CYBER SECURITY & INTERNET SAFETY

PUT TECH AWAY, GO OUT AND PLAY

As adults, we worry about security involving our bank accounts being hacked or our identity stolen. Not too many of us worry about having our pockets picked anymore like previous generations. Crime and security has shifted to the cyber world. Adults however, are not the only ones who are becoming victims of new age technology threats. Our youth is becoming targeted in many ways as well. It is our responsibility as educators to teach our students how to navigate through this rapidly changing world in a safe way.

During our student's 7th and 8th grade Exploring Adolescence classes we have updated and added curriculum to meet these needs. We have previously taught lessons on the topics of appropriate internet usage, laws and consequences related to technology, cyberbullying, digital footprint, and internet safety. With new and unfortunate trends taking place we have added lessons about online addiction, effects of technology on mental health, online enticement through social gaming, and media recognizing potentially dangerous interactions online, how and where to report inappropriate interactions as well as where to get help.

As parents and guardians it is important to be aware and involved in your student's online activities. If schools and families continue to work together, we can help our youth responsibly and safely navigate through this ever changing virtual world. Put the tech away... go outside and play!


MATTAWAN HIGH SCHOOL 2025 NATIONAL MERIT FINALIST



It is with immense Mattawan pride that we announce senior student Sophie Robert's exceptional achievement as a National Merit Finalist. This prestigious recognition places her among the nation's most academically talented students, and we extend our heartfelt congratulations. Over 1.3 million juniors in about 21,000 high schools entered the 2025 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2023 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®), which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state. To become a Finalist, the Semifinalist and a high school official must submit a detailed scholarship application, in which they provide information about the Semifinalists academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership abilities, employment, and honors and awards received. A Semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, write an essay, and earn SAT® or ACT® scores that confirm the student's earlier performance on the qualifying test. We are thrilled to celebrate Sophie Roberts becoming a National Merit Finalist! This incredible accomplishment is a testament to her hard work, dedication, and intellectual curiosity
