BRAINSTRONG FUNDING FUELS SUCCESS

An Update from the Mattawan Public Education Foundation

The arrival of a new school year means Brainstrong time for the Mattawan Public Education Foundation! Each year staff is encouraged to apply for Brainstrong funding that the Foundation awards to enrich and enhance the students' learning experience. In October, members of the Foundation Board were privileged to visit our school buildings and award Brainstrong grants to well deserving teachers. We had a record breaking year and were proud to give out 52 grants totaling \$41,143. Some examples of Brainstrong Grants this year include:

- A sensory light table for the Early Elementary
- Funding for a Lego FIRST Robotics club at the Later Elementary
- A 3D printer, headphones, and other electronics upgrades for the Middle School
- · Materials for an ecolab and a forensics crime lab study at the High School
- Refreshing of books district-wide

The cumulative total for Brainstrong Grant funds reinvested in the district now totals over **\$400,000**; an astounding amount that is only possible thanks to the generous donors that support our Mattawan schools. Along with Brainstrong, The Foundation is granting an additional \$41,500 in financial support to the district for the 2024-25 school year. This amount encompasses a wide range of activities, from staff development, to endowed grants for student connectedness and school safety, to ongoing support for programs across the district such as: Science Olympiad, Beekeeping Club, The Salmon Project, MATH Counts, the Level UP Program, PALS Leadership conference, the high school testing center, and more. The Foundation is grateful to be able to put your donations to use across the district in so many diverse ways.

Charles River STEM Grant Update: The Foundation is pleased to report that the generous grant made by Charles River Labs is being implemented across all five buildings. Some items that have been purchased include compound light microscopes, robotics kits, virtual reality sets, and a multitude of lab and STEM related supplies for classrooms. Mattawan Schools and The Foundation are so fortunate to have Charles River Labs in the community as a partner in creating educational opportunities for students.

Families & Community:

I trust this communication finds you and yours well and that you are enjoying a productive start to the school year. As you know, voters approved two significant bond proposals totaling approximately \$110 Million, covering a variety of much-needed projects. I communicated in August with an update on the summer planning. Since then, we continue to make great progress. Below is a summary of the work to date:

- Site assessments are in the final stages for the immediate stadium area.
- The turf will be striped to accommodate multiple sports.

Traffic Management

- A third party conducted a traffic study; the design team received and is reviewing the results.
- Designs are underway, including flow and additional event and staff parking, as well as the separation of buses, carpool, and student traffic at the middle and high schools.

General planning and placement discussion (tentative) underway for:

New tennis court complex

- Work to be done on the softball and baseball fields and soccer field;
- Youth field placement;
- Placement of field house and aquatic center
- Storm-water management location options.

We are thrilled to report that this approach has resulted in a remarkable improvement each year in both reading and math. Our most recent IRIP data shows that we have successfully decreased the number of students needing intervention to just 9%. This is an incredible achievement!

The power of early intervention is evident in the progress our students are making, and we are proud of their hard work and determination. Thank you for your continued support as we strive to provide the best educational experience for our children.

Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School: Pay Attention to Attendance

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
 Frequent absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other difficulty.
- · By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- · By 9th grade, attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10%, or 2 days a month, over the course of the school year, can affect a student's academic success.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Make school attendance a priority

- · Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day.
- Help your children maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and non-urgent related medical appointments during the school day.
- Keep your student healthy. If you are concerned about about a contagious illness, call your school or health care provider.
 If your children must stay home because they are sick, make sure they have asked teachers for resources and materials to make up for the missed learning time in the classroom.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Help your teen stay engaged

- Find out if your children feel engaged by their classes, and feel safe from bullies and other threats.
- Make sure your teens are not missing class because of challenges with behavioral issues or school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, contact the school and work with them to find a solution.
- Monitor you teen's academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors when necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- Encourage your child to join meaningful after-school activities, including sports and clubs.
 Support your students if you notice signs of anxiety, and if needed, seek advice from your school or health provider

Communicate with the school

- Know the school's attendance policy incentives and penalties
- Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not adding up.

Profits from the Coffee Cart go back into the LINKS class to pay for more coffee supplies, as well as groceries for weekly cooking lessons. This successful program has been in operation for more than 7 years, and we hope to keep it around for many more years to come!
